If I didn't of remembered that, I never would have spotted the well camouflaged bird.

Green Woodpeckers are the largest of their species and the most widespread in the UK. Luckily, they aren't endangered. Their choice of cuisine is solely ants, so they tend to be seen scuttling around on the ground. Make sure to look out for their black moustache. The males moustache contains a red centre. That's how you identify the difference in genders.

Unlike other bird species such as geese, as a whole, woodpeckers don't29migrate. They can be spotted all year round throughout England and30Wales. On occasion, you can even find them as far north as Southern31Scotland. Wherever there is short grass, you might get lucky, as it's the32perfect habitat to witness these fascinating birds. A legend of the game

To any upcoming TV presenter, look no further than Sue Barker as a role model. She is a familiar household name, having worked for BBC Sport since 1993, covering a variety of sports including snooker and horse racing. Her friendly and enthusiastic approach has gained global admiration, particularly within the tennis world. As a former pro in the sport, she went on to be the face of Wimbledon, the UK's biggest tennis tournament. This is despite her not winning any tournaments during her playing career. She presented the programme for 19 years before retiring in 2022.
