



Women's football has a longer history than most people would expect.

In England, in the 1890s, there were a number of women's football clubs, and one north London club, in particular, was reported to have attracted 10,000 people to watch a game.

Preston was the stronghold of women's football at the turn of the 20th century.

Preston's Dick Kerr Ladies Football Club was formed in 1917 and became famous, not only for earning a lot of money for charity from ticket sales, but for being the most successful ladies team in the world until 1965.

Their match on Boxing Day in 1920 had 53,000 people inside the football ground and thousands outside, who could not get in.

However, in 1921, The Football Association (FA) banned women's football from its clubs' grounds, having the view that football was 'quite unsuitable for females'. Fortunately, that changed towards the end of the 1960s, when the Women's Football Association (WFA) was formed in 1969, with 44 clubs as members. Within three years, in 1971, the FA had lifted the ban and the first 'Women's FA Cup Final' was played on an FA ground.

By 2002, football had become a very popular s	sport for women and girls in England and the image of
women's football was further raised by	major tournaments in 2005 and 2012.
