Amber: Okay, Jimmy. This is your desk and your computer. Put your bag down there and I'll give

you a tour of the office and introduce you to some of the other people who work here.

Jimmy: That would be great. Thank you.

Amber: First, let me show you the kitchen. You can make yourself a cup of tea or coffee in here,

and there's a fridge and a microwave if you want to eat your lunch here.

Jimmy: Okay, good. I've brought some sandwiches with me for my lunch today, so I'll put them in

the fridge later.

Amber: Over here we have the photocopying machine and printer. Just ask someone in the office

to show you how it works if you're not sure. We try not to print too much because we

don't want to use a lot of paper. We are an environmentally-friendly office!

Jimmy: Is there a place where I can put my books, files and other paperwork?

Amber: Yes, you have a small cupboard with your name on it at the back of the office. You can

also keep things in your desk drawers. My office is just over there, so please come and ask

me if there's anything else you need to know.

limmy: Thank you. I have a meeting at ten o'clock and I don't want to be late. It's for people like

me who are starting work here today. There are five of us. Could you show me where to

go?

Amber: Yes, of course. I'll introduce you to the others in the office this afternoon. Good luck with

your first meeting.

Javier: Fifty! That's a lot, but it's probably ok. The room is quite big. Did you remember to book the room at the community centre?

Maria: Yes, I did. I've made a booking for Saturday the 8th of July at the Community Centre. The room is available from one o'clock in the afternoon until six pm.

Javier: Oh good! And what about the food? Do you think we should prepare it ourselves? We will be very busy if we decide to prepare the food for fifty people.

Maria: I've already organised the food. The local Italian restaurant is going to make some sandwiches, salads, pizza and cakes for us. They will provide the drinks too, so we don't have to do anything. And it's not going to cost too much money.

Javier: That's great! And what about the music? Have you organised that too?

Maria: Yes, I have. My brother will come and play the music for us. He works in a club so he will choose music that he knows will be good for dancing.

Javier: Well, you have thought of everything. There's nothing that I need to do.

Maria: Oh yes, there is something you can do. You can write all the invitations and post them to the fifty people who will be coming to the party!

A dog walked for more than sixty kilometres, all alone, to go back to its old home at an animal charity shelter in Ireland. The dog, called Cooper, had just started living with a new owner but didn't seem happy. His new owner, Nigel McQuade, was taking Cooper for a walk for the first time, when the dog ran away.

Cooper walked for twenty-seven days, through an area of the country he did not know, to get back to the animal shelter where he used to live. He crossed busy main roads, walked through forests and fields and had almost managed to find his way back to the shelter.

A woman saw him, only a mile from the animal shelter and, thinking the dog was lost, took him there. The staff at the animal charity realised the dog was Cooper and contacted Nigel McQuade. They returned Cooper shortly afterwards to his new owner.

Nigel McQuade was delighted to have Cooper back. He already has one other dog, called Molly, so he hopes that Cooper will learn to like his new home and that the two dogs will become friends. When staff from the animal charity visited Nigel recently, they found Cooper lying comfortably by the fire with Molly.

The Eurovision Song Contest is famous for its amazing costumes, incredible special effects and entertaining performances.

The contest has been held almost every year since it first started in 1956. The first Eurovision took place in Switzerland and was broadcast live on radio and television. There were only seven singers, who performed two songs each, and that year the winner was Switzerland.

Nowadays, many more countries take part in the contest and people around the world can watch the shows on TV. When the contest first began, the singers had to sing their songs in their home language, but now singers can choose to sing in English if they wish.

The contest starts with two semi-finals, and voting takes place until only twenty singers or groups are left. They go on to compete in the Grand Final for the Eurovision trophy. When each singer or group has performed their song, all the countries that have been taking part in the contest take turns to vote for their favourite song.

When the voting has finished, the judges count the points and then they announce the winner and present them with the Eurovision trophy. Usually, the winning country will be the host of the Eurovision Song Contest the following year.
