modest Tom Hanks, Joe tries to bring to justice Emil Muzz and his gang. It doesn't	20
always go to plan, but they are determined to prevent the group from continuing.	21

You would never have imagined this film was set in the 80's. This is due to the	23
magnificent editorial work carried out by Richard Halsey. The quality of the graphics is	24
also a pleasant surprise. However, if Mankiewicz could remake it, I believe he would	25
delete the awful soundtrack in the first scene. It is unnecesary and adds nothing to the	26
overall quality.	27

Kermit the Frog, a green puppet that resembels the animal, has been an iconic star for	3
nearly fifty years. A puppet is a fake object, that looks like an animal, human or mythical	4
character. Its features, including the hands and arms are controlled by a person, known as	5
a puppeteer. The puppeteer also talks, the puppet with a voice. Generally, they can	6
be seen in theatres or during pantomime season, when childrens' stories are brought to	7
life. In addition, they can occasionally appear in films and on TV.	8

Kermit and his puppeteer have been entertaining and making children and adults laugh	10
since 1955. The puppet used to be voiced by its creator, Jim Henson, until he chose to	11

fired after 27 years in the role. At present, Kermit is voiced by Matt Vogal, who in a recent	13
interview recalled his shock at being offered the role. He emotionally went on to say,	14
'After years of hard work, I'm beginning to feel relaxed as the lead puppeteer.'	15

Kermit is the leader of 'The Muppets,' a group of puppets who have had their own TV	17
show, as well as numerous films. Kermit entertainingly tries to bring the group, formed of	18
a variety of characters and 'animals', together. Kermit and Miss Piggy, his long-term	19
girlfriend, are the main characters, along with Fozzie Bear, Gonzo and a very challenging	20

The past
