Text 1

Terracotta Clay Army

The First Emperor of China, Emperor Qin, came to power at the age of 13. He dreamed of being immortal so he ordered his men to build a tomb for himself so that when he died he could be buried with all his treasure. Thousands of workers built a model army of more than 7,500 life-size clay warrior soldiers, officers, 670 horses and 130 chariots to guard his body and treasure. Traps were laid so if anyone tried to rob the tomb crossbows were set to fire automatically. It took 700,000 workers 38 years to build the tomb.

The tomb lay forgotten until 1974 when Chinese farmers accidentally found the tomb buried under their land while they were digging a well.

Archaeologists were asked to uncover the tomb and then made the most incredible discovery buried in the earth. They discovered the life-sized warriors, made of clay, buried together, standing upright, with their horses, as if ready to fight a war. It took many years to fully uncover the army, and since the original find, the archaeologists have also founded clay acrobats, musicians and birds.

Some statues are kneeling and some have bows and arrows made of clay, drawn and ready to fire arrows. They all wear various types of armour made of clay and the average standing hieght of each warrior is 5 feet, 8 inches tall. There are life size chariots and soldiers carry spears and knives and all kinds of weapons, all made of terracotta clay. Each statue is hollow and every clay face is different with different hairstyles and clothes with eyes that seem to follow you everywhere. Some men have moustaches. No two statues look alike. Perhaps they were modelled on the workers who built them but they look so realistic it is quite eerie.

The entire tomb covers 20 square miles and archaeologists are today trying to preserve as much as they can, including the original paintwork which is still evident on some of the statues.

Food for the Brain	
Sugar is your brain"s super fuel, but make sure you are getting the RIGHT TYPE and	
RIGHT AMOUNT at the RIGHT TIME. Too much 'fast' sugar means high blood sugar.	
Excess sugar in the blood gets dumped into storage as abdominal fat. Eating little and	
often helps keep your energy and concentration even. Too much sugar and you may	
be hyperactive and find it hard to concentrate . Too little and you may feel tired ,	
irritable and find it hard to concentrate.	
Eat foods with slow releasing sugars such as green and brown foods:	
Oats, Brown rice, Rye bread, Whole wheat pasta, Brown bread	
Vegetables (Excluding potatoes and parsnips)	
Eating 3 meals and 2 snacks a day will be helping to maintain your blood sugar levels.	
Combine protein with carbohydrates because protein slows down the absorption of	
sugars found in carbohydrates, for example:	
Cereal with seeds/yoghurt/milk; Fruit with yoghurt/nuts/seeds; Soup with seeds	
Toast with egg; Toast with fish e.g. mackerel; Salad with nuts/seeds	
60% of dried brain weight is fat, which has a bad effect on intelligence and behaviour.	
Eating 3 portions of oily fish and a daily portion of seeds helps our brains developing	
and boosts our IQ.	
Mackerel, Herring, Sunflower seeds, Pumpkin seeds, Walnuts, Sardines, Anchovies	
Sesame seeds, Chia seeds, Flaxseeds, Tuna steak, Salmon	
Eat cold-water carnivorous fish 2 or 3 times a week such as sardines, mackerel, herring,	
kipper or salmon. Choose fish oil and starflower or evening primrose oil to supplement	
fats.	
Most importantly, AVOID:	
Deep fried, browned and processed foods.	
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Deep fried, browned and processed foods. Refined sugar: These are essentially carbohydrates robbed of essential nutrients. Chemical food additives: Especially colourings.

Text 3

The Olympic Games

The Olympic Games began over 2,700 years ago in Olympia, in southwest Greece. At that time, only men, boys and unmarried girls could participate and watch the games. Married women were banned but one woman risked severe punishment when she disguised herself as a man so she could watch her son run in the games.

The running track was 183 m (200 yards) long. The Greeks called this length a stade - from which we get the word "stadium". Games included running, long jump, throwing the javelin and discus, wrestling, horse racing, chariot racing and even playing the trumpet.

Winners were given a wreath of leaves, free meals, invitations to parties, and met and married rich women - if they were lucky! A famous wrestler called Milo was said to improve his fitness by carrying a calf every day. As the calf grew heavier, his muscles got stronger so eventually he could pick up a fully grown cow.

These games inspired the more modern Olympic games that we know of today. The first modern Olympic games began in 1896 for men only and females joined in 1900, when it was finally recognised that they were just as able and willing to participate in the games as men. Today, women participate in all sports and are highly competitive.

Weird and Well-Paid Jobs

If you are looking for a unique job that no-one else has, then look no further than Britain. In Britain you can find yourself doing the most peculiar and strange things for quite a good salary.

You could train to be a window cleaner, but not just any ordinary window cleaner. If you get a job cleaning the Gherkin in London, you could earn £50,000 a year. The Gherkin is one of the most iconic buildings in London but with 7,429 panes of glass it needs a lot of maintenance, and whoever has to clean the windows has a tough job on their hands – the building stands at 180 metres tall. It takes 9 cleaners and 10 days to complete the job.

If you don't want to work outside but enjoying the pleasures of a nice warm environment then you could become a bed warmer and earn £16,000 a year? Some hotels still employ people to put on special hygeinic sleep suits and act as human hot water bottles for guests before they arrive.

Do you like travelling? Travel the world as a tea-taster earning £25,000 a year drinking 300 cups of tea a day but you will need to train your palette for five years! Or, if you like tasting things, you could become a pet food taster. A lot of companies make premium brands of pet food and to make sure their products are also fit for human consumption, they require a human pet food taster. You will have to rate the smell and determine whether there is a balance of flavours. You won't need to buy lunch and can earn £20,000 a year.

If you love adventure, work as a Waterslide tester. This job doesn't require much training but you need to be able to swim, and be prepared for slides that may not be up to scratch. Your job is to rate the "splash factor" and what kind of you felt. Get wet and earn $\pm 20,000$ a year at the same time.
