Veganism

Veganism is a lifestyle that excludes all animal products including meat, dairy, eggs and honey. People adopt this way of living for a variety of reasons including ethical beliefs, environmental awareness and personal well-being.

From an ethical perspective, many vegans believe animals should not be used for human benefit. They avoid consuming meat and animal by-products such as gelatine, lanolin, beeswax, rennet and lard. Vegans also steer clear of products like leather, wool and cosmetics that are tested on animals. Vegans see this choice as a commitment to sustainability and responsible consumption.

Environmental reasons are a major influence too. Animal agriculture is responsible for roughly 14.5% of global greenhouse gas emissions. It also contributes to deforestation, water shortages and loss of biodiversity. Choosing a plant-based diet can reduce an individual's food-related carbon footprint by up to 73%, help preserve natural habitats and significantly cut water use.

Health is another motivating factor. Well-planned vegan diets are typically rich in fibre, vitamins and antioxidants. Vegan alternatives include nut milks, meat substitutes made from soya and mushrooms and plant-based margarines. Nowadays, these alternatives are commonly found in all diets. People following vegan diets often report feeling more energised, sleeping better and having improved digestion. For example, plant-based diets tend to be lower in saturated fat, which can support heart health and weight management.

In summary, veganism is not just a diet but a lifestyle rooted in thoughtful choices. It supports animal welfare, benefits the environment and promotes personal health. Although less than 10% of the global population is currently vegan, interest continues to grow. For many, it offers a meaningful way to live with greater awareness, purpose and care for the world around them.

Istanbul's cats

Istanbul's cats sounds like an indie band, yet those who have wandered Turkey's vibrant streets will recognise these renowned felines instantly. Whether prowling through police stations, sauntering along cobbled avenues, or perched with regal indifference in museums and mosques, Istanbul's street cats, or *sokak kedileri* in Turkish, are an intrinsic element of the cityscape. Unlike stray animals in many other nations, these cats are cherished by the local population and safeguarded from harm.

Embedded in Istanbul's historical fabric for centuries, these ubiquitous felines are believed to trace their lineage back to Egypt, where they were among the first domesticated creatures and revered by ancient Egyptians as sacred beings. Scientific consensus suggests that these industrious guardians gradually spread across the globe from Egypt approximately 10,000 years ago, intertwining themselves with human civilization ever since.

Why, then, does Istanbul boast such an abundance of free-roaming cats? The phenomenon may be traced back to the Byzantine Empire which ruled the city, before the Ottomans, for over a thousand years. Like the Ottoman people who followed, the Byzantines lived amid wooden structures vulnerable to rodent infestations. Cats were welcomed as natural protectors of grain stores and homes, becoming woven into daily urban life. When the Ottoman Empire later took control, the tradition of caring for these animals continued and evolved.

Today, estimates suggest that over a million cats call Istanbul home. The city's reverence for its feline inhabitants was once formally institutionalised through the role of mançaç, or "cat sitter." Employed by charitable foundations, mançaçs were responsible for the daily feeding of Istanbul's stray cats, while local veterinarians provided essential medical care. Shopkeepers and residents, contributed by maintaining the cats' environment and safety. This system of structured support remained in place until the 1970s.
